## Purpose of the Community Response Groups

### Community Response Groups planning for an emergency

The more prepared a community is, the more likely it is that the community will be able to look after themselves and others. This plan contains a short demographic description of the Tūātapere area, information about key hazards and risks, information about Emergency Community Emergency Hubs, where the community can gather, and important contact information to help the community respond effectively. Members of the Tūātapere Community Response Group, along with Emergency Management Southland staff, have developed the information contained in this plan. The plan is a living document and can be updated at any time through Emergency Management Southland.

### Community Response Groups during an emergency

During an emergency response, the Community Response Group will be Emergency Management Southland's first point of community contact in an emergency, therefore they play a crucial role in supporting affected communities. The Group will be asked if they think there is a need to activate by Emergency Management Southland, and have the capacity to do so, or they are able to self-activate to provide immediate short-term assistance during an emergency. The Community Response Group works closely with Emergency Management Southland to ensure that resources are effectively distributed and that vulnerable populations are identified and supported. By leveraging local knowledge and networks, the Community Response Group helps to maintain a safe place, communicate vital information, and foster community resilience, ensuring a coordinated and compassionate response to an emergency.

### Community Response Groups into recovery

Community Response Groups will be vital during the recovery of a community. They will be able to act as a connection between the community and the recovery team. They will have key local knowledge and understand the effects of decisions on the local community and will be able to identify areas of most importance to the community and suggest ways to work towards the communities' end goals. # Community Details

## Demographic details

Tūatapere is a small rural township in western Southland, located near the south coast of the South Island and approximately 80 kilometres west of Invercargill. The town sits near the lower reaches of the Waiau River and State Highway 99, and is often referred to as the gateway to Fiordland for the Western Southland area. Surrounded by pastoral farmland, native forest, and rugged coastal environments, Tūatapere provides access to the southern margins of Fiordland National Park. Nearby settlements such as Blackmount inland and Ōrepuki along the coast are closely connected to Tūatapere and form part of the wider local community.



The wider Tūatapere area has a small and stable population with a distinctly rural character and a median age slightly higher than the national average. The community includes long-term residents, farming families, forestry workers, and retirees. Blackmount is a very small inland settlement located within the Waiau Valley, closely associated with sheep and beef farming, while Ōrepuki is a coastal settlement with a mix of permanent residents and seasonal visitors, particularly during summer months.

Historically, forestry, sawmilling, and agriculture have been central to the local economy, with farming continuing to play a significant role today. Tourism is increasingly important, supported by attractions such as the Hump Ridge Track, fishing and hunting opportunities, heritage sites, and coastal recreation. Ōrepuki’s rugged coastline and gemstone beaches contribute to the area’s visitor appeal, while Tūatapere functions as the main service and community hub for surrounding rural settlements.

The Tūatapere–Blackmount–Ōrepuki area is characterised by strong local connections, volunteer organisations, and community-led initiatives, which contribute to local resilience. These social networks are particularly important given exposure to natural hazards such as river flooding, coastal erosion along the Ōrepuki shoreline, and seismic risk common across Southland and the lower South Island.



## Identified potential vulnerable sub communities

Emergencies affect all of us. Depending on the nature, extent and timing of an emergency, some people can be more affected than others. We need to ensure equity in response to improve assistance to all in the community. Groups who may need consideration include:

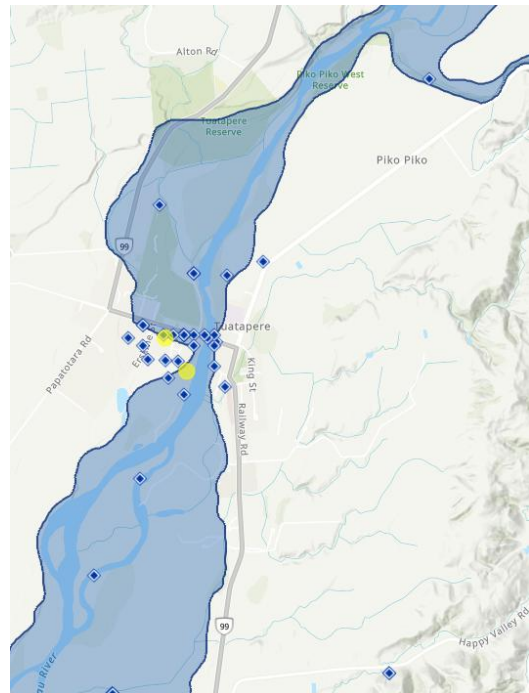
# Tūatapere Community Hazard and Risk Summary

## Overview

Hazard and risk information serves to provide a clear understanding of the potential dangers that could impact the community. These hazards and risks outline the nature, characteristics, and potential effects of the hazard, which is crucial to gain an understanding of the dangers the community faces.

### 1. Flooding

- **Risk Level (Priority):** High
- **Description:** Tūatapere is highly susceptible to riverine flooding due to its proximity to the Waiau River. The township has experienced significant historical flooding, most notably in 1984 when widespread inundation occurred across Southland. Prolonged rainfall and high river flows can pose a risk. Surface flooding from intense rainfall can also impact low-lying areas. Eg. Orawia Rd, Happy Valley Rd, Pukemaori Rd and the Coast road.
- **Impacts:** Property damage, farmland inundation, road closures, isolation, disruption to services, and potential evacuation.
- **Mitigation Strategies:**
  - Maintain drainage systems and flood banks.
  - Keep waterways and culverts clear.
  - Elevate valuable equipment and supplies in flood-prone areas.
  - Prepare emergency plans, including evacuation routes.
  - Monitor weather and river level updates.

## 2. Severe Weather (Heavy Rain, Wind, Storms)

- **Risk Level (Priority):** High
- **Description:** Tūatapere is exposed to severe weather systems coming from the Tasman Sea and Fiordland, bringing heavy rainfall, strong winds, and storms. These events can occur year-round but are more frequent in winter and spring.
- **Impacts:** Power outages, road closures, flooding, fallen trees, infrastructure damage, and isolation.
- **Mitigation Strategies:**
  - Secure loose outdoor items and structures.
  - Maintain trees and vegetation near buildings and roads.
  - Keep emergency supplies and backup heating available.
  - Stay informed through weather warnings and alerts.

## 3. Earthquake

- **Risk Level (Priority):** Medium
- **Description:** Tūatapere is located in a seismically active region of the lower South Island, with potential influence from nearby fault systems including the Alpine Fault. Large earthquakes are infrequent but possible.
- **Impacts:** Building damage, road disruption, utility outages, injury risk, and possible isolation.
- **Mitigation Strategies:**
  - Secure heavy furniture and appliances.
  - Develop household and community emergency plans.
  - Strengthen older structures where feasible.
  - Practice “Drop, Cover, Hold.”

## 4. Critical Infrastructure Failure

- **Risk Level (Priority):** Medium
  - **Description:** Tūatapere relies on key lifeline services such as electricity, telecommunications, water supply, and transport routes. Its relatively remote location increases vulnerability to extended outages, particularly during storms or flooding events.
  - **Impacts:** Loss of power and communications, limited access to essential services, water supply issues, and potential isolation.
  - **Mitigation Strategies:**
    - Maintain emergency kits with sufficient food, water, and supplies.
    - Use alternative heating and lighting sources safely.
    - Store fuel where necessary.
    - Strengthen community response networks.

## 5. Biosecurity (Pests and Animal Disease)

- **Risk Level (Priority):** Medium
  - **Description:** Tūatapere's agricultural and forestry-based economy is vulnerable to biosecurity threats, including invasive plant species, animal pests, and livestock diseases. These can spread through stock movement, equipment, visitors, or natural pathways.
  - **Impacts:** Economic losses, reduced productivity, animal health impacts, restrictions on stock movement, and environmental degradation.
  - **Mitigation Strategies:**
    - Follow good on-farm biosecurity practices.
    - Maintain accurate stock records (NAIT compliance).
    - Clean equipment and control farm access.
    - Report unusual pests or animal health concerns promptly.
    - Participate in regional pest management efforts

### Hazard risk summary table

- **Likelihood:** Probability that the hazard will occur in or impact Tūātapere.
- **Impact:** The scale of consequences the hazard would have on the community (people, infrastructure, economy, environment).
- **Note:** This assessment has been based on qualitative judgment and local context to guide how likelihood and impact are rated. For example, flooding is “High” likelihood in Tūātapere due to known historical events, even if flood defences are present.

## Community Emergency Hubs

Community Emergency Hubs provide pre-identified places where the community can gather in the event of an emergency. Not all hubs will be suitable during an emergency, and it is up to the community to decide at the time. It is possible that a new venue will need to be found, but the concept of a location where the community gather is vital during a response as people seek immediate support, shelter, comfort and information.

Each pre-determined location will be provided with an Emergency Community Hub Guide and be able to access advice from Emergency Management Southland if they require further information or support. Contact information for the hubs will be available on the following page.

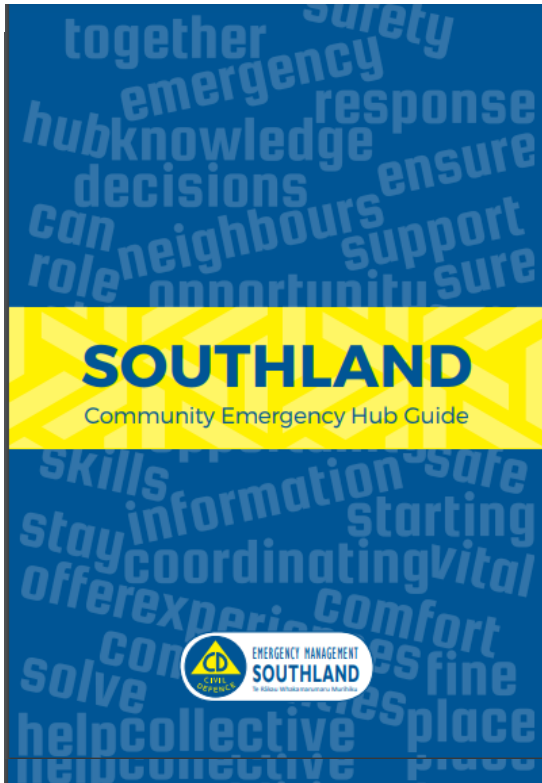

### Basic items for a Community Emergency Hub

When opening a Community Emergency Hub, it's essential to bring basic items to support coordination, communication, and community-led response. These items are critical to help the community self-organise, share information, and meet urgent needs during a disaster when emergency services may be delayed. These items may include:

- Water
- Tea, coffee, milk
- Food
- Toilet paper
- First aid kits
- Blankets
- Torches
- Lighters
- BBQ/ LPG bottle
- Games
- Lighting
- Generators/ fuel
- Anything else that you feel is appropriate

## HUB ROLES

### 1. Hub supervisor

It's important someone has an overview of what is going on. Decisions should be made by agreement, but it's helpful if someone can bring everything together. Remember you're a team, and as a group you'll be able to consider the immediate needs of those in the community, and what community assets and resources are available. The supervisor can change depending on the situation, and as people with more experience join the Hub team they may be willing to step into the role.

#### HUB SUPERVISOR KEY TASKS

- make sure other roles are allocated
- make sure everyone has what they need to do their job
- make sure new people joining the hub are invited to join the team
- make sure each area of the Hub works with the other areas as a team
- record major decisions for future reference, including what happened and any actions taken
- develop a roster to ensure people have adequate breaks and don't work too long
- close the Hub overnight when appropriate
- secure the property and provide information about open times to the community
- let the Emergency Coordination Centre know when the Hub has closed and when it is open again
- close the Hub when the community no longer needs it
- supervise the Hub clean-up when permanently closing
- work with media that show up:
  - do provide any public or general information such as weather details, open hours, and copies of public information such as media releases
  - do not give out private information such as details on injuries or deaths, addresses of evacuated homes or personal information you've received
- Ensure the Hub team understands the following legal information:
  - if you don't have special legal powers in your normal life, you don't have any in a state of emergency either
  - if a situation is life threatening, saving life is the priority, but remember usual laws apply

## Community VHF Radio

A community VHF radio (Very High Frequency radio) is a key tool for communication during emergencies, especially when other forms of communication, like mobile phones or landlines, are unavailable due to network failures or power outages. This can be a communities only way to communicate with the Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) if telecommunications have been disrupted due to an emergency event. Training to become familiar can be provided. Instructions on how the VHF radio are attached to the radio.

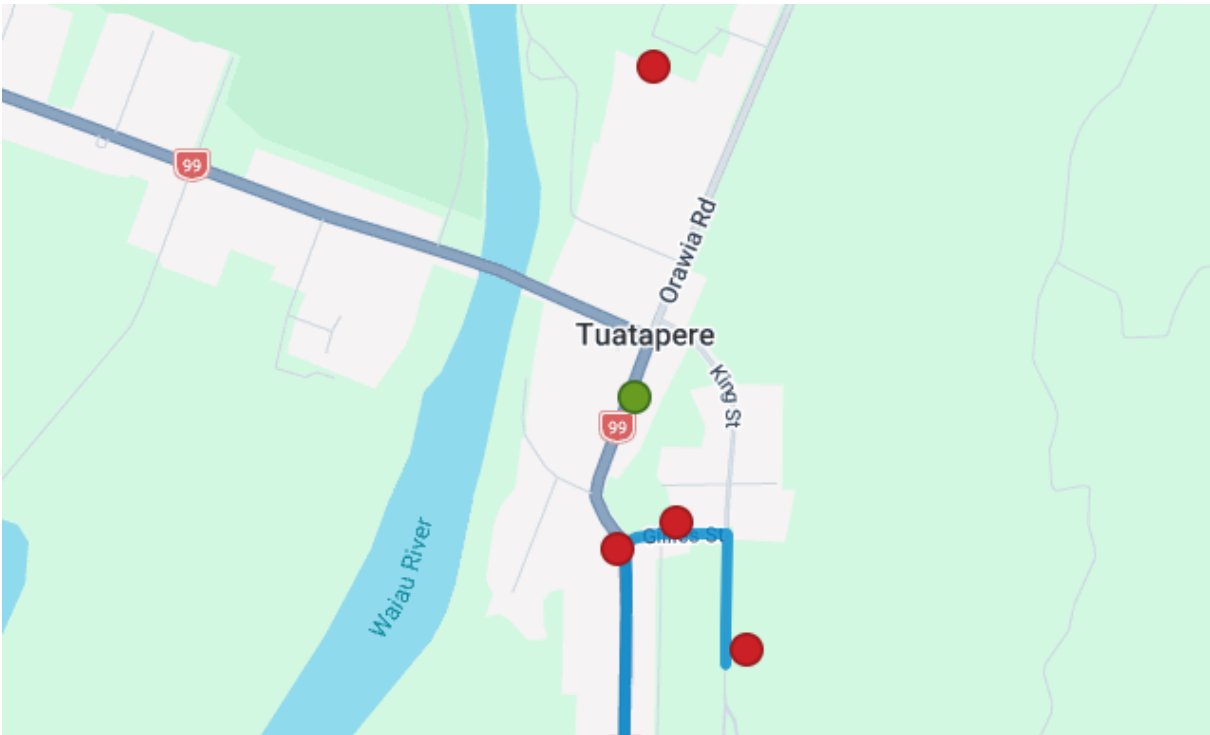

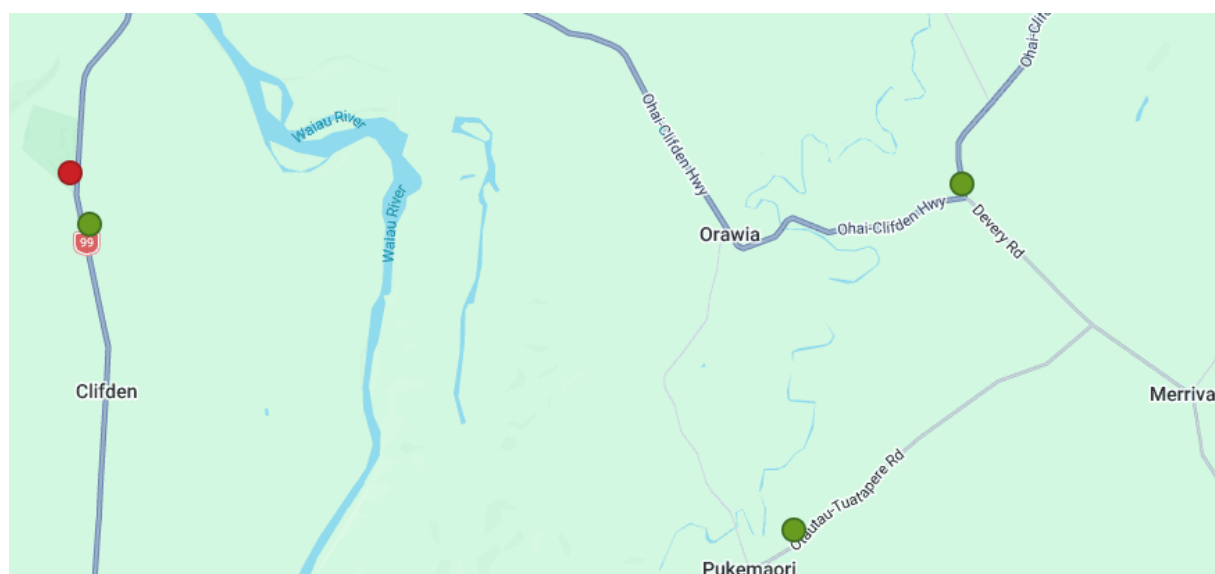
